Chris's Chatter

Following the school summer holiday weeks, we come to the end of August and start of September with schools, colleges and universities gearing up for the new session. Other groups, clubs and organisations that also take a break over the summer are also holding their AGMs, planning and agreeing their syllabuses for the new year and seeking to recruit new members and there's plenty of information about some of the things that are on offer at the

information about some of the things that are on offer at the West Kirk for all ages in this edition of the magazine together with a look back at some of the summer highlights.

Learning is essential for all of us, whatever our age, for – whoever we are - our circumstances are always changing and we need to learn to adapt to those changes. I read a book on holiday about pilgrimage - its biblical history in the wanderings of the people of Israel in the Old Testament, the early Christian teachers who moved around constantly and from Roman times those who made special journeys to "religious sites", through the Middle Ages where pilgrimage became big business as a penance, sometimes even undertaken for by someone in the place of the offender and then the Reformation where pilgrimage all but stopped, ending in today's world where there has been a huge upturn in the numbers taking on a pilgrimage – in order to reflect and to learn from others as they travel.

The book emphasised that it's not just the walk, or the time away, or the virtual sessions on a computer (for pilgrimage can take many forms) that are important, it's what one does with what one has learned when one returns. When Jesus encountered folk during his ministry he often challenged them to respond to the encounter — Bartimaeus, the woman at the well, the woman caught in adultery. Peter, Carla and I are reading through various different books and discussing them to learn, to be inspired in order to plan together as a team. I'm also part of a group of ministers (all within their first 5 years of ministry) who meet each month to learn from those with more experience. I hope and pray that some of what I learn I will be able to

share with others in the coming weeks and months as we seek to resolve the restructuring of the churches and share God's love with our communities.



What are you learning or planning on learning this Autumn? It would be great to hear your ideas and share your wisdom with each other.

Presbytery Mission Planning Update

Following the congregational vote in June which resulted in 7 congregations voting for the union and 2 against, the transition team have been working on a way forward over the summer.

- We have, with the help of volunteers from our churches, arranged 2 Walk and Talk events to Arbirlot and Colliston, with more planned in the Autumn.
- We have enjoyed united worship and fellowship in Summer services in July and August.
- A prayer evening was held in July in St Andrew's Chrurch with another planned on 10th September in Carmyllie Church.
- Question and Answer sessions open to all members of the Arbroath churches have been held in an effort to give as much information as we can about the formal side of the process as well as ideas and vision for the future.

These have been opportunities to enjoy spending time together but also to learn more about one another.

 A meeting has been held with Rev Fiona Smith, the principal clerk of the Church of Scotland to consider how we go forward from a legal point of view. Further professional information on one of our buildings that we were waiting for has now been received to enhance our thinking.

In September the transition team will meet with Presbytery to decide on the next steps with a view to a second vote the following month. We do appreciate that this process has been longer and more frustrating than many of us anticipated and involves both a sense of lament and grief. Please pray for one another — as parts of the body of Christ — "as we walk the extra mile or hold up a sister who's struggling or sit with a brother who's afraid. We are part of something so much bigger than any one of us and blessed to be so."

Following the General Assembly, the Church of Scotland magazine, **Life & Work,** produces a summary of the debates and decisions that were taken there. We are going to produce that summary over the next few magazines to give you a flavour of the debates but also the breadth of the work and society that the church is involved in.

"A NEW REFORMATION"

The convener of the Church of Scotland's Assembly Trustees has urged the Church to display a new spirit of Reformation in the face of falling membership and ministry shortages. The Rev David Cameron told the General Assembly that it was a "critical time" for the church, but encouraged Commissioners to imagine an exciting future. "Imagine Church where members are enthusiastic about doing things differently," he said. "Imagine listening to one another and dreaming bold dreams and having the energy and encouragement to experiment and learn in the process. Imagine being able to move forward in positive ways, tackling serious issues of the day, responding to the real need in Scotland. Imagine finding a creative way of getting different people with different views together to create a different future. Imagine planting new church communities where they've always been needed, breaking out of our constrained systems to do so. "Sharing ministry for the pastoral care of the elderly in the aging congregations

whilst recognising the need to be intergenerational, fully integrating our young people, shaping the life of the Church.

"The new alongside the old, energising and inspiring with the gospel imperative, 'go and make disciples'."

In his speech as outgoing Moderator, the Very Rev Dr Iain Greenshields urged all congregations to "take a long, careful look at who we are". He added: "Out of lament and grief comes new life and new identity." And this year's Moderator, the Rt Rev Sally Foster-Fulton, closed the week saying that the church was "the body of Christ" with "hands that aren't afraid to get dirty", "feet that walk the extra mile", and "here to hold up a sister who's struggling or sit with a brother who's afraid". And she added: "We are part of something so much bigger than any one of us and we are blessed to be. So, challenges — bring them on."

PRESBYTERY MISSION PLANNING AND CHURCH CLOSURES

Mr Cameron acknowledged the hurt and pain that had been caused by the Presbytery Mission Planning process over the past year, which he admitted 'has felt harsh and rigid and people have not been as kind and pastorally sensitive as they should have been'. But he said the time had come to "lay down burdens which have been exhausting us all." The Trustees agreed to a proposal from the Rev Dr Doug Gay instructing them to explore alternative approaches to ministry planning which would ensure churches that can afford a minister (or be supported to afford one, in the case of deprived areas) would be permitted to call one.

However, the Assembly rejected an Overture from the Presbytery of Glasgow which would have appointed a Special Commission to review the Mission Planning process. Mr Cameron said that setting up a Commission at this stage would be premature and bring delay, but assured the Assembly that review was built into the process. He urged them to "embrace instead the task of rolling up our sleeves and getting involved in this good work going forward."

During the debate of the General Trustees, the Assembly was assured that there is no quota for the number of church buildings that should

be closed. As some Commissioners expressed concern about the number of churches that are earmarked for closure under Presbytery Mission Plans, the Rev Scott Rennie, vicechair elect of the Trustees, said: "There is no quota. There has never been a quota, in any presbytery." Adding that buildings could either be an asset or a drain on mission, he added: "The point of the exercise, in partnership with presbyteries, has been to try and find that middle balance, alongside affordability."

The Trustees accepted a new section from the Rev Dr Grant Barclay confirming that "the Church of Scotland seeks to have adequate spaces in as many places as are properly affordable." Dr Barclay said that he feared the Church wanted "a handful of Rolls Royces" for its buildings, "when what Scotland needs is a fleet of Fords."

The Assembly also approved a section welcoming progress on the Presbytery Mission Planning Act, despite Dr Gay saying he didn't think that reflected the feelings across the Church about the Mission Planning process: "I think we have gone about this in a way which has been disempowering to congregations and harmful to our mission."

Harvest vegetable soup recipe

This creamy-textured soup has a really lovely flavour – and it's so easy

to make. (Thanks to the NHS Website)

Prep: 15 mins Cook: 30 mins

Serves 4 Ingredients

1 medium-sized onion, finely chopped

1 leek, trimmed and sliced

1 carrot, diced

200g swede or turnip, diced

1 medium-sized potato, diced

400ml reduced-salt vegetable or

chicken stock

1 tbsp cornflour

600ml 1%-fat milk

75g sweetcorn

1 pinch ground black pepper

To serve

4 wholemeal rolls (optional)

Method

Put the onion, leek, carrot, swede or turnip, potato and stock into a large saucepan. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer, partially covered, for 25 minutes, until the vegetables are tender.



Information:

You could use butternut squash or sweet potato instead of swede or turnip, if you prefer.

Blend the cornflour to a smooth paste with 2 to 3 tablespoons of the milk. Add the remaining milk to the saucepan with the sweetcorn, then stir in the blended cornflour. Heat gently, stirring constantly, until the soup thickens and just begins to boil.

Season with black pepper and ladle into bowls. Serve each portion with a wholemeal roll, if you like.

Information:

Cool the soup and store in a covered container for up to 3 days, or freeze for up to 3 months.


